The Brighton and Hove Commemorative Plaque Panel has supported the application by The Secret WW2 Learning Network, in partnership with the University of Sussex Resistance Studies Network, for blue plaques to be placed where these four WW2 agents were either born or had lived in Brighton.

Each plaque will be installed and formally unveiled at separate events during early 2017, and the only occasion on which all four blue plaques will be on view together will be during today's unique 'Grand Reveal' ceremony.

LIEUTENANT JACQUELINE NEARNE MBE Croix de Guerre

1916 - 1982

"Designer"
FRENCH SECTION of the Special Operations Executive (SOE)



Jacqueline Françoise Mary Josephine Nearne was born in Brighton at 32 West Hill Street on 27 May 1916.

The family relocated to London and in 1923 to France, eventually to Nice where Jacqueline finished her schooling and became a sales representative for an office equipment company.

Following the fall of France in 1940 the Nearnes moved to near Grenoble, in the unoccupied zone. In April 1942 Jacqueline and her sister Eileen reached England via Spain and Portugal and in July Jacqueline joined the First Aid Nursing Yeomanry (F.A.N.Y.) for secondment to French Section, S.O.E.

After training she was approved as a courier to the STATIONER circuit and parachuted into France with her circuit leader, Maurice Southgate on 25 January 1943. Jacqueline carried messages to and from the Résistance cells and other circuit members, meaning long and tiring train journeys over a huge area.

More than a year's strenuous work left her exhausted, and Jacqueline was flown back to Britain on 9/10 April 1944. Following recuperation and additional training Jacqueline declared herself ready to return to active duty, but Allied advances in France negated her return.

Jacqueline Nearne was awarded the MBE and, by the French, the Croix de Guerre. Post-war, she worked for the United Nations in New York until retirement and her return to England in 1978, but only four years later Jacqueline died of cancer on 15 August 1982, aged 66 years.



CAPTAIN RONALD TAYLOR

1916 - 2002

"Tenente Plastico"

ITALIAN SECTION of SOE - No. 1 Special Force




Ronald Gordon Taylor was born on 2 October 1916 at 29 Carlton Street, Brighton, to Thomas and Jane Taylor. Ron attended St John's elementary school in Carlton Hill, followed by Varndean Secondary School and Brighton Municipal Technical College, gaining an engineering degree. He moved to London for work and joined the Royal Engineers of the British Army in October 1939.

Soon commissioned, he served in England as a military bridging expert before, seeking a more active war, he volunteered for S.O.E. in October 1941. Ron Taylor received paramiltary and parachute training in Palestine and was posted to No. 1 Special Force at Monopoli in Italy, where he was briefed as one of a three-man team to be sent to the COOLANT mission, supporting Italian partisans fighting the Germans.

The drop was on the night of 12/13 August 1944 and the team immediately started sabotage training for the partisans and carrying out operations against the enemy. In November 1944 orders were received to cease operations and to prepare for final efforts the following spring.

In December the COOLANT team accompanied the Italians in joining up with Yugoslav partisan forces and they were flown out from Črnomelj in Yugoslavia in February 1945. Taylor was awarded a Mention in Despatches and the Italian Partisan Medal.

Postwar Ron Taylor resumed his successful engineering career, returning to Brighton, marrying and starting a family before moving to Surrey. Having settled in later life in Buckinghamshire, in 2002 he moved to Dorchester, but died there on 10 December, aged 86.



CAPTAIN MICHAEL TROTOBAS

1914 - 1943

"Capitaine Michel"

Michael Alfred Raymond Trotobas was born on 20 May 1914 at 1 North Place, Brighton, the son of a French father and an Irish mother.

Michael's mother died when he was only nine years old and he was sent to live in France with an aunt. His schooling was completed there and in Ireland and, after drifting from job to job for several years, he joined the Middlesex Regiment of the British Army in 1933.

After war broke out, he served in northern France and, wounded, was fortunate to be evacuated from Dunkirk. Commissioned as an officer in the Manchester Regiment, he then volunteered for S.O.E. and in September 1941 was in a group of six agents parachuted into Vichy-controlled France.

After only a month he was arrested, but escaped in July 1942 and made his way back to Britain via Spain and Portugal. Two months later he again parachuted into France to create a new circuit, FARMER, in and around Lille. From May 1943, he began sabotage operations in which he personally participated.

On the morning of 27 November 1943 the enemy forced their way into his lodgings in Lille and in the subsequent shoot-out, Trotobas was killed instantly.

SOE's submission for a Victoria Cross for Trotobas was turned down and in the post-war confusion of the organisation's disbandment, no other award was granted.



CAPTAIN EDWARD ZEFF MBE Croix de Guerre

1904 - 1973

"Georges 53"
FRENCH SECTION of the Special Operations Executive (SOE)



Edward Zeff has long deserved to have his story told. He was born into a British Jewish family at 22 Hanover Crescent, Brighton on 22 April 1904 and educated at the York Place Elementary Schools.


He joined his older brother in Paris around 1922 to develop the family tailoring business there and returned to Britain, with his French wife, after the fall of France in 1940.

Zeff joined the Royal Signals of the British Army and then, despite scant knowledge of soldiering and no experience of clandestine warfare, he volunteered for S.O.E. to work as a secret agent in enemy-held France in one of the most dangerous roles possible - that of radio operator.

German detection services were eventually hot on Edward Zeff's trail in the city of Lyons, but it was only when he was trying to return to Britain that he was betrayed and captured as he was about to cross the Pyrenees into Spain. Badly tortured and interrogated in Paris, he nevertheless held firm - only to then be sent to Mauthausen concentration camp.

As a Jew and a British agent, his fate should have been doubly sealed, yet somehow this remarkable man managed to survive. He was awarded the MBE (Military) and, by the French, the Croix de Guerre.

Edward Zeff returned to Brighton to live at 94 Embassy Court with his wife, but subsequently returned to his business in Paris and died there in 1973.




